It suggests that a lack of face-to-face contact during lockdown combined with young people spending a lot of time online, has contributed to the problem.

Gooseberry Student 'Discussion' of the week

Communicating with friends online can be great fun and a good way to keep in touch when we are unable to meet up face to face. Video chat can make our online interactions almost as good as meeting in person. However, there can be disadvantages.

Explore the topic:

- Who are safe people to communicate with online?
- What are the risks of communicating online with people you don't know in real life?
- What are the particular risks of video chat? *Think about revealing personal information, that videos can be screenshot or recorded, that people might not be who they say they are.*
- What sort of things should never be shared online? *Think about being kind, polite and about boundaries - not damaging your reputation or that of others.*

Activity: For younger children: Think about ways to respond to either contact from someone online that you don't know in real life.

For older children: Think about ways to resist pressure from someone online to behave inappropriately.

Gooseberry Parent 'Message' of the week

Keeping an eye on what your child is up to online can be difficult, especially if they have been sent home from school and you are trying to work from home. For younger children, agree some ground rules about who they can communicate with online, how long they spend and where they use their devices. Remind them about only communicating with your permission and with people they know in real life. Ensuring that communication takes place in communal areas can avoid your child being manipulated by groomers. For older children, talk about boundaries in their behaviour online and the need to resist pressure from others who try to persuade them to behave inappropriately. Groomers can be adept at manipulating children – reassure them that you will be there to support them if they make a mistake.
